Public Items

1. Conduct a public hearing to consider a Resolution, declaring the City's intent to issue federally taxable private activity revenue bonds for the Shawnee Industrial Park LLC Project in the principal amount not to exceed \$8,168,000 for the Shawnee Industrial Park LLC Project.

Bonds will be used to finance the cost of acquiring, constructing, equipping and furnishing two flex/industrial buildings totaling approximately 56,000 square feet, generally located at 18740 - 18760 Johnson Drive within the City, and to lease the Project to the Company. A public hearing and Resolution are required.

Recommendation: Conduct a public hearing.

Recommendation: Adopt the Resolution declaring the City's intent to issue federally taxable private activity revenue bonds in the principal amount not to exceed \$8,168,000 for the Shawnee Industrial Park LLC Project.

2. Conduct a public hearing to determine whether the fire damaged structure at 14104 W 48th Street should be repaired, razed, or demolished and consider adopting a Resolution directing the structure to be repaired or removed, and the premises made safe and secure.

On April 24, 2023, the Governing Body adopted Resolution No. 2006 setting a public hearing. The property was significantly damaged by a fire on December 22, 2022.

Recommendation: Conduct a Public Hearing to consider the evidence and information presented.

Recommendation: Conclude the Public Hearing.

Recommendation: Consider adopting a Resolution, to give the property owner of 14104 W 48th Street reasonable time to complete the demolition or repair of the structure and restore the property to compliance with the Shawnee Municipal code. The resolution shall direct and order the owners to obtain a building permit within 45 days to demolish or repair the structure. The resolution shall also stipulate that all required work be completed prior to the expiration of the building permit and that if the work is not diligently prosecuted and completed in a timely manner in accordance with the direction of the Governing Body, the Chief Building Official is authorized and directed to proceed with the demolition of the structure.





Public Hearing for Fire Damaged Structure at 14104 W 48th St.

July 10th 2023

1. Public Hearing to discuss Fire Damage Structure at 14104 W 48th Street. 14104 W 48th Street caught fire and sustained significate damage on December 22, 2022. On April 24, 2023 the governing body adopted resolution 2006 which set this public hearing. This public hearing is to allow interested parties to present evidence on why this structure is or is not dangerous, unsafe, unfit for human habitation, or blighting to the surrounding properties. The Governing Body will determine if the structure is dangerous, unsafe, unfit for human habitation, or blighting to the surrounding properties.



- Hearing Process
 - The Governing Body will listen to any evidence on the condition of the structure.
 - If the Governing Body determines the structure is NOT dangerous, unsafe, unfit for human habitation, or blighting to the surrounding properties. Then the hearing will be concluded and the insurance money being held by the City will be returned to the owner.
 - If the Governing Body determines the structure is dangerous, unsafe, unfit for human habitation, or blighting to the surrounding properties. Then the Governing body will adopt a resolution that shall fix a reasonable time within which the repair or removal of the structure shall be completed. Hearing will be concluded.
 - If owner fails to comply with the resolution then the public officer may cause the structure to be repaired or removed.
 - If structure is repaired or removed within time fixed by the resolution then the insurance money shall be returned to owner.









Exterior Violations

- Paint

Interior Violations

- Inadequate means of egress.
- No Sheetrock
- Open electrical
- No toilet facilities
- No bathing facilities
- No lighting
- No heat
- No hot water
- No running water
- No cooking facilities



- Staff Recommendation
 - Determine the structure is dangerous, unsafe, unfit for human habitation and a blight to the surrounding properties and order structure to be repaired.
 - Pass the resolution stating time frames for completion of the repair or demolition.
 - Obtain building permit with 45 days
 - All work completed and pass final inspection prior to expiration of the building permit

2023 Legislative Wrap Up

- 800 Bills Introduced 89 Bills Passed 15 Bills Vetoed 8 Vetoes overridden
- 77 Bills became effective on July 1, 2023
- State Ends Fiscal Year above estimates, collecting approximately \$10.2 B
 - April Consensus Estimates showed an approximate ending balance of \$1.9 B; in addition to a \$1.48 B Rainy Day Fund
- Local Impact
 - HB 2298 Officer Donald B. Gamblin, Jr., Memorial Highway Designation
 - SB 144 Video Competition Act exempting streaming services
 - HB 2019 Cyber Security Event Reporting within 12-hours
 - HB 2083 Vacant Property Registration next session
 - HB 2196 Expanding the Deferred Retirement Option Program for Law Enforcement
 - HB 2059 Allowing Creation of Permanent Special Districts for Common Consumption

During the 2021 Legislative Session, Senate Bill 13 was enacted, establishing new notice and public hearing requirements if the proposed budget will exceed the revenue neutral property tax rate.
